Mission statement, Objectives, Charity Aims and Activities

Cued Speech Definition

Cued Speech is a visual/manual code for spoken languages that enables accurate lip reading. As a speaker says each word, they make handshapes near the face that replace the missing acoustic information for the deaf receiver.

Benefits of Cued Speech

- Using Cued Speech in the language of the family enables the deaf child and adult to become a fully active and integrated member of the family.
- Cued Speech can be learnt in 20 hours by hearing people with whom the young person is in contact.
- Using Cued Speech from early infancy onwards gives deaf children the basic language proficiency required to progress academically alongside their hearing peers, and thus acquire the same qualifications needed to evolve personally, socially and professionally;
- Enables two-way communication alongside Sign Language;
- Improves the ability of a deaf person to participate in the hearing world.

Cued Speech Vision Statement

Our vision is to ensure that all deaf children and adults are given full access to English or their home language through Cued Speech regardless of hearing loss; with this they can develop their language and literacy skills, to reach their full potential socially, emotionally and economically.

Cued Speech Mission Statement

"Deafness is a difference in sensory experience from a hearing person. Language deprivation is a neurological emergency." Language first

We recognise that a deaf child has the same potential as any hearing individual to understand and use language. If the language of their home is verbal, their issue is simply one of speech perception: they cannot hear what is being said; it is possible to replace the acoustic information they are missing with visual information through Cued Speech.

Cued Speech is entirely functional for speech perception (see Metzger and Fleetwood 2010 and Shull and Crain 2010).

CSUK's mission is to:

- Inform, train and support families free of charge to Cue their spoken languages.
- Inform, train and support professionals using Cued Speech and signpost others to it.
- Gain recognition through social media, publicity, and advocacy with the people, services and commissioning bodies with whom Cued Speech is most relevant and where outcomes can be most effective.

Through these actions we want to ensure deaf children and adults avoid the negative and life-long cognitive impairment, social isolation and academic failure caused by language deprivation.

Statement of Rights

A deaf child or adult has a fundamental right to

- language and communication;
- receive a full education;
- succeed to their maximum potential regardless of disability;
- be safe.

These rights fit with the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child and are fundamental to the mission and aims of CSUK.

Cued Speech Core Values

C:- to Collaborate with agencies and services in order to meet the needs of deaf children and adults.

U:- to **Understand** the specific needs of deaf children and the professionals and family that support the child.

E:- to provide **Equal** opportunities in language access.

Over the next 5 years CSUK aims to convert the Cued Speech Mission Statements into deeds and positive outcomes, so that deaf children and adults have the greatest opportunity to meet their potential.

Achievements and performance

It has been a remarkable year for the growth and development of the Charity. We have more than doubled our training delivery, created a new website, written a new Impact Report, devised new training tools, games, Cued songs and resources, contracted a new freelance training team and fund-raised and contracted new Family Support Practitioners across the UK, in addition to attending conferences and generating interest throughout the UK with our work-shops and seminars and the family activity day.

The expansion of our activities across the UK in 2018 – 19 meant an increase in expenditure into 2019 – 2020. While we had planned for this, the challenging nature of accessing continuing core income through applications to Trusts and Funds meant that we needed to cut our expenditure in quarters three and four in order to balance our accounts. We achieved this through careful reduction on spending for travel, attendance at conferences and through a reduction in hours for some core staff including the Executive Director. Hours were re-instated for the new financial year 2019 - 2020. Income and expenditure for projects such as the Family Support Practitioners, on-line training and the CSUK Residential remained in balance throughout the year.

Reducing travel meant that we needed to find a way to deliver training and information on-line and this was achieved through the development of our on-line Foundation Training and improvements to our website. With the addition of videos, Cued stories and parent testimonials, we also vastly increased our activity on our Facebook page. Overall, this meant that the dissemination of information and training to families of deaf children and the professional team around the child, continued to grow and the numbers of people who accessed our services was increased from the previous year. On reflection this also put the Charity in a very stable position as we entered into 'lockdown' due to Covid 19 at the end of the Financial Year, as we already had all our resources accessible on-line and remotely and were already using ZOOM.

Our activities

1. Reaching out to professionals and families through Publicity and Advocacy

Our conviction remains, that the more professionals who know about Cued Speech, the greater the number of families of deaf babies/children who will be informed about the significant difference Cued Speech can make on their language and literacy. There has been a positive impact from the work that we achieved last year visiting hospitals, universities and children's service workgroups and the initial networking is leading to really positive relationships and many more enquiries from families, new organisations and schools for training and information.

We now have a highly influential Patron, Mr.Gavin Morrison MA FRCS who is an Otolaryngologist and Cochlear Implant (CI) specialist who is committed to finding out how Cued Speech can improve the rehabilitation and language learning potential with his patients.

In total we have presented to over 430 professionals.

On-line and Media Development

We have had phenomenal development on the website with regular blogs, videos and training updates. We have been providing regular content for our Facebook pages and we have nearly 2000 followers. Additionally, we have furthered our reach through Instagram, YouTube and Twitter.

Our activities (continued)

2. Training for professionals

This has been an extraordinary year for the creation of our Free to families, on-line Cued Speech Foundation Training. The training consists of 36 very short films, to encourage the learner to understand the principles and learn the skills of Cued Speech in their own time. Currently 150 people have logged onto the site. We have sold 4 group licenses to professionals. We have further plans to continue to develop the training offer to include a self-assessment level and practice area.

<u>In total we have delivered training to 616 professionals - through workshops, on-line training, schools and hearing-impaired services.</u>

3. Training for families

This year has seen the development of several new Family Support Practitioner (FSP) posts. Kirsti Moore, in South Wales, hosted by the Local Authority and accommodated by Torfaen Sensory Impairment unit. Kirsti runs 2 regular groups for mums, deaf babies and toddlers and met with 25 families with a deaf child.

In April we appointed 2 part time FSP's in Hertfordshire, hosted by the local Authority. The hosting arrangement works extremely well as the Authority benefits through having additional capacity and CSUK benefits by having direct referrals from Teachers of the Deaf within the teams. In January 2020 we appointed Carly Simpson who operates peripatetically within Tyneside and adds a wealth of on-line material to Facebook and our website which includes Cued stories, short videos and word games.

In total across the UK we delivered 187 home visits ranging between 1.5 to 2 hours long and 49 sessions of on-line tuition. Additionally, we have been involved in 38 school visits. In total we have trained 190 family members.

Residential

Every year we run a residential for deaf children, their families and siblings and this year we held it in Hertfordshire to support our Family Support Practitioner in that region. These are always very successful events and we have very positive feedback. "The great thing about Cue Residential is that you get to meet other families with deaf children, it means so much to share stories and it means so much to our children to meet other children who have a deaf sibling.....we love coming and we love the activities for the kids so that we can attend class and not worry about the children..."

Conclusion

2019 - 2020 has seen a dramatic increase in referrals of children and professionals due to the presence and the impact of the Family Support Practitioner posts and due to the increase in our profile through media and presence at Deaf Events. Our on-line training has also stimulated much interest and we hope that this will more than double over the next three years.

Conclusion (continued)

The Cued Speech UK team are dedicated to the Charity, we enjoy what we do and we believe that we can make a difference to deaf children. The impact of this is that every individual gives more than they are contracted to deliver. This year we have done a sponsored half marathon and raised over £500. We had a Christmas Tree at the Christmas Festival and raised over £700.

Given our current strong position to deliver our services and the current interest in Cued Speech, we know that 2020 and beyond is going to be an exceptional time for the continued growth and development of the Charity. Supported by UK based Research and the very positive relationship that we have with the London Cochlear Implant Consultants, we are now in a position to continue to fully utilise our funds professionally, strategically and practically.

Looking forward, we are aiming for sustainability through continuing to build relationships with Trusts, through a wider range of events, seeking individual donors, through training fees from professionals, and though still in early stages, through licencing a Speech to Cue Avatar currently in development. CSUK will be more robust with a range of income sources.

Financial review

Income

Total income received in 2019/20 was £249,423, of which £236,941 was donated by charitable trusts, companies and individuals. The remaining £12,482 included tuition fees and charges, membership subscriptions and investment income.

Expenditure

Total expenditure was £284,136.

Reserves

Expenditure exceeded income by £34,713 resulting in decrease in funds from £165,935 to £131,222, of which £90,554 is restricted to specific work.

The Association's policy is to hold a designated reserve of £20,000 and in addition, operating reserves equivalent to not less than three months' expenditure. The balances held at 31 March 2020 met that requirement.

Small company provisions

Notes to the Financial Statements

Year ended 31 March 2020

1. General information

The Charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales and a registered Charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is The Boatshed, Steamer Quay Road, Totnes, Devon, TQ9 5AL.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the Charity's ability to continue.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees to further any of the Charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

Incoming resources

Income

All income is included in the statement of financial activities when the Charity is entitled to the income, any performance related conditions attached have been met or are fully within the control of the Charity, the income is considered probable and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Donations and legacy income is received by way of donations, legacies, grants and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Where legacies have been notified to the Charity but the criteria for income recognition have not been met, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset and disclosed if material. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the Charity, are recognised when the Charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.

Income (continued)

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the Charity, being the amount the Charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market.

Investment income is included when receivable.

Income from charitable trading activity is accounted for when earned.

Resources expended

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates:

Costs of raising funds comprise the costs associated with attracting donations, grants and legacies and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the Charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the Charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SOFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis, as set out in the notes to the accounts.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

An increase in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of a revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, unless it reverses a charge for impairment that has previously been recognised as expenditure within the statement of financial activities. A decrease in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, except where it offsets any previous revaluation gain, in which case the loss is shown within other recognised gains and losses on the statement of financial activities.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

For the purposes of impairment testing, when it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

For impairment testing of goodwill, the goodwill acquired in a business combination is, from the acquisition date, allocated to each of the cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination, irrespective of whether other assets or liabilities of the Charity are assigned to those units.

Stocks

Stocks are measured at the lower of cost and estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell. Cost includes all costs of purchase, costs of conversion and other costs incurred in bringing the stock to its present location and condition.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the Charity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Debt instruments are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Where investments in shares are publicly traded or their fair value can otherwise be measured reliably, the investment is subsequently measured at fair value with changes in fair value recognised in income and expenditure. All other such investments are subsequently measured at cost less impairment.

Other financial instruments, including derivatives, are initially recognised at fair value, unless payment for an asset is deferred beyond normal business terms or financed at a rate of interest that is not a market rate, in which case the asset is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Other financial instruments are subsequently measured at fair value, with any changes recognised in the statement of financial activities, with the exception of hedging instruments in a designated hedging relationship.

Financial instruments (continued)

Financial assets that are measured at cost or amortised cost are reviewed for objective evidence of impairment at the end of each reporting date. If there is objective evidence of impairment, an impairment loss is recognised under the appropriate heading in the statement of financial activities in which the initial gain was recognised.

For all equity instruments regardless of significance, and other financial assets that are individually significant, these are assessed individually for impairment. Other financial assets are either assessed individually or grouped on the basis of similar credit risk characteristics.

Any reversals of impairment are recognised immediately, to the extent that the reversal does not result in a carrying amount of the financial asset that exceeds what the carrying amount would have been had the impairment not previously been recognised.

Defined contribution plans

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

When contributions are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the end of the reporting date in which the employees render the related service, the liability is measured on a discounted present value basis. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as an expense in the period in which it arises.

4. Limited by guarantee
